

Insights into Kneeling

Our parishioners at Mass who sit in the two central blocks of pews in the church will already have noticed the new padding on the kneelers. It's most important as a parish to be people of reverence and humility. In coming months, new kneelers with padding will be added to the whole church. The posture of kneeling has a long history.

From the Old Testament, kneeling was regarded as a position of submission adopted toward a superior person or deity for purposes either of petition or worship. Solomon, son of David, prayed while kneeling, as did Ezra and Daniel. The Hebrew word meaning "to kneel" also means "to bless" suggesting that a person receiving a blessing would assume that position. Accordingly, kneeling was regarded as a particularly appropriate position for making a petition.

This was also the posture taken during prayer by Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. Stephen was also kneeling as he was martyred. The Roman soldiers mocked Jesus by kneeling before him.
